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Questions for Reflection

One commentator on Luke 6:17–26 writes,

"Blessed' (makarios) does not simply describe a state of happiness or bliss.

Rather, it refers in a theological sense to one's standing before God (Deut. 33:29; Pss. 1:1; 40:4)."*
